Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP) Rules Announced

- Signup begins May 26 goes to August 28
- \$250,000 per person or entity limit
- \$900,000 AGI eligibility test for average of 2016, 2018, and 2018 tax year

CFAP Payments - Crops

Payment Rates (per bushel)

Crop	Rate
Corn	\$0.335
Soybeans	\$0.475
Sorghum	\$0.310

Based on the LOWER of:

- 50% of 2019 production
- Unpriced inventory on January 15

Corn Example

200 bushels per acre of 2019 production(100 bushels max bushels for determining payment)

140 bushels in inventory on Jan 15

Payment will be based on 100 bushels

\$33.50 per acre (100 bushels x \$0.335)

Two installment

\$26.80 (80% of \$33.50), guaranteed \$6.70 (20% of \$33.50), made if funding exists





CFAP Payments - Cattle, Hogs, Dairy

Rates (per head)

ltem	Paid on sales between Jan 15 and April 14	Paid on highest inventory, April 16 to May 14
Slaughter cattle (breeding livestock)	\$92	\$33
Slaughter cattle (fed)	\$214	\$33
Feeder cattle (<600lbs)	\$102	\$33
Feeder cattle (>600lbs)	\$139	\$33
Pigs (< 120 pounds)	\$28	\$17
Hogs (> 120 pounds)	\$18	\$17

Cattle and hog payments made on unpriced inventory


\$6.18 on total milk production in January, February, and March
